Jesus Feminist by Sarah Bessey is the Wise Words Book Club selection for August.

Perhaps there is a way to be a woman and follow your giftings and love Jesus madly at the same time. In *Jesus Feminist*, Sarah Bessey takes a thoughtful look at biblical teaching, church practices, and Jesus' earthly ministry to explore the possibility and freedom available to women.

Called to Protect and Code of Valor are books 2 & 3 in Lynette Eason's Blue Justice Series

After being dumped by her fiancé for another woman, Chloe has decided that Hank is just about the only male she likes. She's over the whole romance thing and focuses her attention on doing her job. Because a serious case of human trafficking with connections to her missing cousin just landed in her lap. When US Marshall Blake MacCallum's daughter goes missing, he's ordered to kill the judge he's protecting and tell no one about his daughter's disappearance or she will die. Blake races against the clock to rescue his daughter while Chloe and Hank are asked to be a part of the task force assembled to bring down the traffickers. Chloe finds herself attracted to the silent, suffering man, but thanks to her previous bad judgment, she wonders if she can trust him. And can Blake trust himself around this firecracker of a woman.

A Silken Thread by Tracie Peterson

Eighteen-year-old Laurel Millard, youngest of seven children, is expected to stay home and "take care of Mama" by her older siblings, but Laurel has dreams of starting her own family. Operating a silk loom at the Atlanta Exposition will give her the chance to capture the heart of a man wealthy enough to take care of Laurel and any children she might bear, as well as her mother.

NEW FICTION BOOKS

A Bound Heart by Laura Frantz

Though Magnus MacLeish and Lark MacDougall grew up on the same castle grounds, Magnus is now laird of the great house and the Isle of Kerrera. Lark is but the keeper of his bees and the woman he is hoping will provide a tincture that might help his ailing wife conceive and bear him an heir. But when his wife dies suddenly, Magnus and Lark find themselves caught up in a whirlwind of accusations, expelled from their beloved island, and sold as indentured servants across the Atlantic. Yet even when all hope seems dashed against the rocky coastline of the Virginia colony, it may be that in this New World the two of them could make a new beginning together.

The Memory House by Rachel Hauck

When Beck Holiday lost her father in the North Tower on 9/11, she also lost her memories of him. Eighteen years later, she's a tough New York City cop burdened with a damaging secret, suspended for misconduct, and struggling to get her life in order. Meanwhile a mysterious letter arrives informing her she's inherited a house along Florida's northern coast, and what she discovers there will change her life forever. Matters of the heart only become more complicated when she runs into handsome Bruno Endicott, a driven sports agent who fondly recalls the connection they shared as teenagers. But Beck doesn't remember that, either. Decades earlier, widow Everleigh Applegate lives a steady, uneventful life with her widowed mother after a tornado ripped through Waco, Texas, and destroyed her new, young married life. When she runs into old high school friend Don Callahan, she begins to yearn for change. Yet no matter how much she longs to love again, she is hindered by a secret she can never share.

Fifty years separate the women but through the power of love and miracle of faith, they each find healing in a beautiful Victorian known affectionately as The Memory House.

The Tinderbox by Beverly Lewis

With her Amish parents' twentieth anniversary approaching, eighteen-year-old Sylvia Miller stumbles across a surprise—the old brass tinderbox her clockmaker father keeps in his Lancaster County shop has been left unlocked. Against her better judgment, Sylvia opens the cherished heirloom, not realizing that what she is about to discover will splinter apart her happy life.

From the Pastor's Desk

Sabbath

Sabbath. It's a Jewish word. It is also one of the ten commandments. It is meant to help remind us that the world does not depend on us to keep spinning. We may not finish all of our work in five or six days, but we honor God when we pause from our work. It reminds us that the Lord is in control and that even God rested after six days of creation. It is meant as a time of worship, renewal, time with others, and rest. Sabbath helps us have a proper rhythm to life. It is meant to be a forced reminder to rest.

Sabbath isn't just about a day to rest every week. I don't want to discount that, because that regular time of a day off for worship and rest after the work week is at the heart of what God wants for us in the call to honor the Sabbath. It is also about being re-created at times during our lives. We practice this in our vacations. Those times when we have the gift of being able to step away from the daily grind, often to a different location. We certainly can't run away from our responsibilities on a regular basis, but to step away from our daily duties for a chunk of time often helps us to come back refreshed and recharged for the season ahead. I believe this practice helps us to honor Sabbath.

We live in WNY. You probably noticed some time ago that we don't always have the best weather for a number of months in a row. What does that mean? WNYers are pretty good at making the time and space during our nicer weather months at finding ways to re-create and renew. We often do this by going away to visit family and destinations, we like to camp and be outdoors. When many people are away it impacts church life, it certainly makes it difficult to maintain certain programs during summer months and we see worship attendance impacted for those months at most churches. Some churches even feel a significant budget pinch if people only give when they attend, when the reality is ministries tend to have a consistent budgets.

I don't think we have to see people being gone in the summer as a negative thing in the church. I support you in your quest to make room for Sabbath in your life, and I believe we can even end up in a place of greater health and strength as a church if our congregation is rested and have slowed their rhythm down for a period of time. I ask you for a few considerations as we head into our warmer months.

Make room for Christ. Whatever way you adjust your life routine in these months ahead be intentional about making room for Jesus. If your Sunday school class is on a break, and you find yourself away from Springville on a number of Sundays you will need to think about your walk and spiritual life a little differently. This can be a really good thing. Find a spiritual book that might encourage or stretch you. Work through a shorter book of the Bible, or maybe one of the Gospels. Open yourself to prayer as you are fishing or other practices that the weather opens up for you. Find ways to worship Christ no matter where you find yourself.

Stay connected. If you are in town on Sunday, please continue to make worshiping with your sisters and brothers in Christ at SIUMC a priority. Perhaps you could make the effort to invite someone from church over for dinner or to meet up at the Dairy in order to be in strong relationship even on days other than a Sunday. Continue, or jump in, with our Psalm a Day and know that others from SIUMC are praying the same scripture you are everyday.

For July and August we are having one unified service at 10:00. This gives us the space to have need for fewer volunteers each week, while also having more voices as we sing and a greater energy than if we divided ourselves in two services for these months. All Church Celebration July 14 - Catch the Fire

The Catch the Fire All-Church Celebration July 14 can only be described by that over-worked word used in TV commercials for auto sales... huge! Don't think you are too young or too old to participate. The teens will be staffing the obstacle courses to ensure their safe enjoyment. We all need to be praying for safe travel for former pastors and members who will be travelling and for nice weather. The only qualification necessary for these tasks is saying, "Yes." You will be empowered and equipped-that is, told and shown- what to do.

Most importantly, we need to open our hearts to this event fanning the flames of our faith. This is not just another church picnic. Here are the reasons why the phrase "Catch the Fire" was selected for use as a theme/title for our All-Church Celebration:

Catch the Fire is symbolized by the Methodist cross and flame: The cross proves Jesus crazy, passionate love for us. He died for us. After Jesus death and resurrection, He gave us His Holy Spirit, which is symbolized by a flame. When we catch the fire, we are enveloped by a powerful force that enables us to spread/pass on Christ's love to others.

It is first necessary for us to Catch the Fire for us to be Empowered by God to love and serve others. Even before Christ died for us, He lived for us, leaving us an example of God's love for us and the love we can live as we serve others.

Think about how the gospel spread like wildfire after the first Pentecost in Acts 2. Imagine the tremendous, unstoppable power of a wind-driven fire brush or forest fire. That is the goal of Catch the Fire.

Communion will take place at the worship service on August 4th.

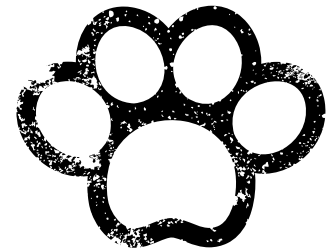

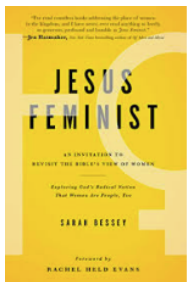
